 The platform is window dressing, the important parts are your poster/art work and pitch






- There will be default settings

Purpose Audience Content





Research / Art Pitch: the Purpose

- To introduce yourself
- To engage people in conversation






- To entice people to read your poster or really look at your art
- To open up possibilities for "networking"

Research / Art Pitch: the Audience

Enthusiastic

Elements of Plain Language

- Language that anyone can understand
- Little jargon / few technical terms
- Specialized concepts are explained

Guide to Using Plain Language

Research / Art Pitch: the Content

1) Make the title of your project interesting!

- 2) Talk about the research in a way that connects with the audience.
- 3) Talk about the impact / significance of the work.

Research / Art Pitch: the Content

Your five-minute pitch is not ...

- a recitation of your abstract
- a selected reading from your essay or project
- a rambling explanation of your art or project

- 4. Research question, thesis statement, or hypothesis
- 5. Method, methodology, or approach
- 6. Results
- 7. Discussion, implications, or conclusion

Write out a draft — sections 3 to 7 should be thought of as small chunks.
